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

Greetings from Doreen

Among the millions of heavenly lights established with accuracy on the fourth day of creation, one had awesome responsibility: consider St. Matthew's account of the first Christmas when the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us – and we beheld His glory (St. John chapter 1).

Matthew reports, "After Jesus was born in Bethlehem, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, "Where is He who has been born, King of the Jews? We saw His star when it rose and we have come to worship Him." Perfect timing – set in motion before time had fully begun. "And the star they had seen when it rose went ahead of them until it stopped over the place where the young child was. And they bowed down and worshipped Him!"

Many circumstances prohibited the pleasant, peaceful presence of Jesus in clean hay in a carefully sanitised manger as shown on most Christian Christmas cards! Caesar Augustus decreed that everyone in the entire Roman world should return to his own birthplace to be counted for a census. As a result of this decree, prophecy concerning the birthplace of the Messiah was fulfilled (see Micah chapter 5). Mary's pregnancy was almost completed, when Joseph and Mary set off for Bethlehem. A donkey, a bumpy road, maybe, early birth pains — and when they reached Bethlehem, there was no room vacant for the weary couple. So, as St. Luke writes, "Mary wrapped Him in cloths and placed Him in a manger, because there was no room available for them." And, maybe, no friendly faces to welcome the child — only people who might have picked up the gossip from other people from Nazareth. "It's Mary, who was pledged to be married to Joseph. But before they came together — she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit!!"

The steadfast stars continue to shine. God always accomplishes His plans and purposes. When we do not know what to do, wise advice is given is 2 Chronicles chapter 20: "We have no power to face this vast army that is attacking us. We do not know what to do BUT OUR EYES ARE UPON YOU."

Today we face a vast army of disbelief, dislike, distrust, even direct ridicule for our faith in Jesus, Saviour of the world. Look up and rejoice – your plan for time and eternity was affirmed before time itself. Enjoy the carol with this chorus:

"O star of wonder, Star of Light, Star of royal beauty bright, Westward leading Still proceeding, Guide us to your perfect Light."

Look up. The God Who lit the Christmas star before time began knows all you need and cares for you – always.

Ask the Pastor



That may sound a strange question, with an obvious answer. And so, why am I discussing it?

Recently I was speaking to somebody who had been listening to a Christian speaker, who said that it was wrong to celebrate Christmas. The argument went that we are not told to do so in Scripture, we are only instructed to remember Jesus' death. In addition to that, it is only a pagan festival which has become commercialised.

I must admit straight away, as you may have gathered from elsewhere, that I am a massive fan of Christmas. I love the weeks leading up to it; the sights, sounds and smells. It is lovely to send and receive cards and presents. As I think I have mentioned before, it gives me a lovely warm feeling.

I appreciate that not everyone feels the same way about the season, sometimes Christmas brings about sad memories, and it can be associated with things in people's lives that are not so good. And, even though 25th December may be the date of a pagan festival, we don't have to use it in a pagan way, we can worship God on that day. And I agree that there is a lot of commercialism associated with the festive season, but we don't have to be caught up in that either.

But, is it *wrong* to celebrate Christmas?

Now, it is true that we are not told to celebrate Jesus' birth in the Bible. And there are many more verses about his death and resurrection than his birth. But that does not make it wrong.

Just consider what an amazing thing happened. God, the one in control of all things, the one who is so awesome and mighty that we cannot understand Him, came here, to this earth, where we live, as a human being. Surely that is worth celebrating.

And yes, His purpose in coming was actually to die! He came to be the Saviour of the world, as the woman at the well in John's Gospel came to realize. As He died, He took the punishment for sins that had separated us from God. And now we can know God. That is why it is important that we remember His death, which we do, as we take the bread and wine at Communion, and with His resurrection at Easter (Another pagan festival!).

But, in order for Jesus to die, He had to be born in the first place. And the fact that He was born in such humility, put in an animal feeding trough, is significant. He identified with us as human beings. And we must never forget that. Surely that is worth celebrating!

Christmas is also a great time to share this message with others. We can tell the world the good news that a Saviour has been born. I found an old Christmas carol which I don't think is sung very much these days, but it sums this up well.

Rejoice and be merry
in songs and in mirth!
O praise our Redeemer;
all mortals on earth!
For this is the birthday
of Jesus our King,
Who brought us salvation,
His praises we'll sing!

And so, should we celebrate Christmas? It's a definite YES from me!

200 Years of Silent Night

Did you know that Christmas Eve 2018 will be the 200th anniversary of the world's favourite carol? The song that we know as 'Silent Night' is sung in hundreds of languages and in hundreds of thousands of churches all around the globe, and it never fails to come top in polls of peoples' favourite carols. Some of the stories about how it came to be written, however, are nothing more than legends.

It was on 24 December 1818 the beautiful words and haunting melody of 'Stille Nacht! Heilige Nacht' were heard for the very first time, sung in German to a guitar accompaniment, in a small village church in Oberndorf in the Austrian Tyrol. The author of the new carol was Father Joseph Mohr, assistant pastor of the Church of St Nicholas. In 1816, while serving as a young priest in the isolated pilgrim church of Mariapfarr, he wrote a simple four-verse poem reflecting on the night of Jesus' birth. Joseph's grandfather lived nearby and some writers speculate that he may have been inspired by the divine beauty of the stars above as he walked through the snowy mountains to visit the old man. In 1817 Joseph was transferred to Oberndorf, near Salzburg, and in December 1818 he showed his poem to his friend Franz Gruber who was a musician and schoolteacher, and conductor of the church choir. Joseph asked Franz to write a melody to sing the poem at midnight mass - although nobody knows why he particularly wanted to sing a new carol. Many stories have since come to be told about the carol's origins; for example that hungry mice had chewed through the bellows of the church organ, and a new song had to be hurriedly written to be sung to the guitar instead! In fact, there was plenty of time for it to be practiced in advance of the first performance, at which Joseph played the guitar accompaniment himself while the choir was conducted by Franz Gruber.

Four verses?! In fact, both the tune and the words of Silent Night have changed significantly over the past two centuries. The earliest surviving manuscript dates from about 1820 and shows that the carol then had 6 verses, sung in four-part harmony by the choir, with the last line repeated by the congregation. In the years since, it has been adapted rearranged numerous times. One of the first people to make it famous was Karl Mauracher, a master organ builder from the Ziller

valley, who was hired to repair the Obendorf organ. He obtained a copy of the lovely carol and shared it widely as a 'Tyrolean Folk Song.' Then, in a way that may remind us of the story of the 'Sound of Music', two travelling families of folk singers called the Strassers and the Rainers started including the carol in their concerts, performing in the city of Leipzig in December 1832, to an altered tune similar to the one we know today. In 1855 the Rainer family performed the carol before the Austrian Emperor, Franz I, and the Russian Tsar, Alexander I.

Franz Gruber died in the town of Hallein, where Joseph Mohr's guitar can be seen in the local museum. In 1848 Joseph Mohr died penniless in the Alpine village of Wagrain, and he was described as 'a reliable friend of mankind, toward the poor, a gentle, helping father.' The greatest memorial of him, however, will surely be his beautiful carol, and its timeless message of heavenly peace.
